

Wetland and Salmon Restoration a Team Effort on the Green River

An army of volunteers brave the elements and give wildlife new habitat on the Green River

The Green River is a critical watershed for the region, serving over 400,000 people with fresh water and calling several species of salmon and wintering steelhead as its residents. Along the banks of the River just east of the City of Auburn lies the 105-acre Auburn Narrows Natural Area. Auburn Narrows is considered a key wetland and wetland buffer for the Green River, its aquatic residents, and other animals like bald eagles, black bears, blue heron, and elk.



Restoration Efforts Need Your Help

Restoring Auburn Narrows to its natural habitat has been a priority for King County and its partnering agencies for many years. Together with hundreds of volunteers, as well as partners such as Earth Corps and Tacoma Public Utility, efforts are underway to restore 65 acres of land by enhancing the wetlands and adding over 20,000 native plants.
