## What is a Green Team?

A Green Team is a group of students ready to take action to become environmental stewards at school, at home, or out in the community. Green Team activities can focus on reducing waste, improving recycling, or promoting habitat stewardship.

### Green Teams

- learn about conservation.
- educate others.
- turn learning into action.
- gain real-world experience.
- improve communication skills.
- see results of their choices.
- benefit the school or community.

### Teachers

- receive advice, support, and materials.
- can sign up for classroom presentations.
- can receive mini-grant funding.
- are recognized for their efforts.

# How to Become a Green Team

- 1) Work with your students to identify a project or activity that they want to complete. Use ideas included in this brochure as a starting point, or request assistance or a visit from one of King County's Green Team specialists.
- 2) Register your Green Team to become eligible for prizes and awards, to hear news from other Green Teams in the county, and get assistance, if needed, from a Green Team Specialist.

Green Team projects are a great way to get your students interested and involved in protecting our natural resources. Schools can truly benefit from the increased awareness of their students as they actively participate in improving or cleaning up their local environment.

## Green Team Benefits: Free Resources Available to You

Do you want help getting a project underway? Are you already doing something but want to join a network of other teachers and schools also working on projects? Contact 206-583-0655 or email greenteam@triangleassociates.com. A variety of support is available to help you get started:

**Assistance and Advice** – If you need help thinking of ideas or planning a project, King County Green Team Specialists are available to answer your questions or provide more information for a specific project. You can also find ideas on King County's website at [your.kingcounty.gov/solidwaste/secondaryschool/gtprojects.asp](http://your.kingcounty.gov/solidwaste/secondaryschool/gtprojects.asp).

**Classroom Visits** – Do you have your own environmental project in mind? Are your students ready to take action but need help

determining what that action may be? If you need assistance to get your project started, a specialist is also available to come to your classroom for project workshops, free of charge, Monday-Friday. Resources such as storm drain stenciling kits, worms for food composting projects, and litter clean-up materials are available.

**Green Team Campaigns** – Green Team campaigns provide your class or club with easy-to-follow, step-by-step instructions for implementing a project. Instructions include how to plan, organize and implement your project as well as engage the school community and promote your successes. Campaigns include carpooling, paper recycling, and plastic bottle reuse and recycling. **Green Team Mini-Grants** – King County Solid Waste Division offers mini-grants in amounts up to \$500 to support educational activities related to waste reduction, recycling, and resource conservation. Applying is quick and easy, but resources are limited.

**Networking** – Find King County on Facebook. Search for "King County Green Team" and become a fan.

**Publicity and Recognition** – Green Team actions are worth rewarding! Twice a year, King County recognizes Green Teams that have completed projects and rewards them with certificates and prizes such as pens made from recycled materials or reusable water bottles. Your team's projects may also be highlighted in the Class Act newsletter or on the web.

## Green Team Project Ideas

### Educate Others

- Design a bulletin board display or posters to inform students of the importance of conserving natural resources or undertaking recycling projects.
- Create weekly or monthly intercom or televised announcements to share conservation tips with the school.
- Create skits, presentations or interactive games to encourage waste reduction and resource conservation actions. Present them at your school or at a local elementary school.
- Mentor younger students by connecting with an elementary school in your area. Teach them how to recycle, or read a story to them on recycling. Free storybooks are available from King County.
- Plan environmental "spirit days." Encourage students to research and take actions such as reducing waste, reusing items, bicycling, and carpooling to reduce their "ecological footprint."

### Take Action to Improve Recycling

- Audit your school's waste reduction and recycling practices to see what's working well and what more can be done. Make sure that recycling bins are clearly marked and easily located in each classroom and throughout the school.
- Perform classroom spot-checks to make sure garbage and recycling are separated properly.

### Green Your School and Community

- Organize a litter clean-up. Arrange for teams of students to pick up trash on school grounds and in the community. Identify trouble spots and potential solutions to prevent future litter.
- Plan an event to exchange clothes, books, electronic equipment or other reusable household items. Or organize your school as a drop-off site for collecting those items to donate to a community organization for the needy.



- Organize a carpool campaign at your school to reduce your carbon dioxide emissions, fight the effects of climate change, and improve air quality.

### Get Your Hands Dirty

- Start a school garden, either in the ground or using containers. Encourage students to find "green" ways to control pests, conserve water, and produce a healthy garden. Start a compost pile to recycle garden waste.
- Start a worm bin to encourage students to recycle their food waste. Sign up for a worm bin classroom visit from a Green Team Specialist.
- Remove invasive species and learn more about native plant ecology by restoring or creating a natural area.
