**AMENDMENT TO THE CONSERVATION FUTURES
INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT
BETWEEN KING COUNTY AND THE CITY OF ISSAQUAH
FOR OPEN SPACE ACQUISITION PROJECTS**

Preamble

The King County Council, through Ordinance 9128, has established a Conservation Futures Levy Fund and appropriated proceeds to King County, the City of Seattle and certain suburban cities. This amendment is entered into to provide for the allocation of additional funds made available for open space acquisition.

THIS AMENDMENT is entered into between the CITY OF ISSAQUAH and KING COUNTY, and amends and attaches to and is part thereof of the existing Interlocal Cooperation Agreement entered into between the parties on the 26th day of February, 2009.

The parties agree to the following amendments:

Amendment 1: Article 1. Recitals

A paragraph is hereby added to the Recitals Section to provide for Conservation Futures Levy Fund Allocations for the Issaquah Creek Waterways acquisition Project, and hereafter reads:

- On December 9, 2013 the King County Council approved Ordinance 17707, which appropriated a total of Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) in Conservation Futures Levy proceeds to the City of Issaquah for the Issaquah Creek Waterways acquisition Project. On April 28, 2014 The King County Council approved Ordinance 17795, authorizing the King County Executive to enter into interlocal agreements with the City of Seattle and the suburban cities for the disbursement of Conservation Futures funds authorized in Ordinance 17707.
- On November 17, 2014 the King County Council approved Ordinance 17941, which appropriated a total of Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000) in Conservation Futures Levy proceeds to the City of Issaquah for the Issaquah Creek Waterways acquisition Project. On April 20, 2015 The King County Council approved Ordinance 18023, authorizing the King County Executive to enter into interlocal agreements with the City of Seattle and the suburban cities for the disbursement of Conservation Futures funds authorized in Ordinance 17941.
- On September 14, 2015, the King County Council approved Ordinance 18110, which allocated a total of Zero dollars (\$0) and added eight parcels to the Issaquah Creek Waterways acquisition Project scope, to further the project goals. On November 9, 2015, the King County Council approved Ordinance 18151, authorizing the King County Executive to enter into interlocal agreements with the City of Seattle and the suburban cities for the disbursement of Conservation Futures funds and project scope changes authorized in Ordinance 18110.

Amendment 2: Article V. Conditions of Agreement

Section 5.1 is amended to include reference to Attachment K, which lists 2014 and 2015 Conservation Futures Levy Allocations and a 2015 Project scope change for the Issaquah Creek Waterways acquisition Project.

Amendment 3: Article VII. Responsibilities of the County

The first two sentences of this article are amended to include references to Attachment K, which lists which lists 2014, and 2015 Conservation Futures Levy Allocations and a 2015 Project scope change for the Issaquah Creek Waterways acquisition Project, as follows:

Subject to the terms of this agreement, the County will provide Conservation Futures Levy Funds in the amounts shown in Attachments A through K to be used for the Projects listed in Attachments A through K. The City may request additional funds; however, the County has no obligation to provide funds to the City for the Projects in excess of the total amounts shown in Attachments A through K. The County assumes no obligation for the future support of the Projects described herein except as expressly set forth in this agreement.

Amendment 4: Attachment K

The attachments to the interlocal agreement are hereby amended to include references to Attachment K, which is hereby attached to the interlocal agreement, incorporated therein and made a part thereof.

In all other respects, the terms, conditions, duties and obligations of both parties shall remain the same as agreed to in the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement as previously amended.

This document shall be attached to the existing Interlocal Cooperation Agreement.

Issaquah Creek Waterways:

2014: 1047228 Issaquah - WLCF ISS Issaquah Creek Waterways

2014: \$250,000 is added to this project, which will acquire additional property within this multi-year, multi-parcel acquisition project, which has a goal of preserving critical streamside habitat. There are six target parcels along Issaquah Creek within the City of Issaquah. The first priority target acquisitions for this year are situated at or near the confluence of the main stem of Issaquah Creek and the North Fork of Issaquah Creek. The highest priority is a 1.61-acre property at the confluence of the two creek branches. The property contains important habitat for salmon and other aquatic and wildlife species.

1047228 Issaquah - Issaquah Creek Waterways

This multi-year, multi-parcel acquisition project will acquire property along Issaquah Creek in the City of Issaquah, with a goal of preserving critical streamside habitat.

2015: \$250,000 is allocated to this project, which will acquire additional property within this multiyear, multi-parcel acquisition project, which has a goal of preserving critical streamside habitat. There are six target parcels along Issaquah Creek within the City of Issaquah, with the first priority target acquisitions for this year situated at or near the confluence of the main stem and North Fork of Issaquah Creek. The highest priority is a 1.61-acre property at the confluence of the two creek branches. The property contains important habitat for salmon and other aquatic and wildlife species.

1047228 Issaquah - Issaquah Creek Waterways

This multi-year, multi-parcel acquisition project will acquire property along Issaquah Creek in the City of Issaquah, with a goal of preserving critical streamside habitat.
