

**AMENDMENT TO THE CONSERVATION FUTURES

**Preamble**

The King County Council, through Ordinance 9128, has established a Conservation Futures Levy Fund and appropriated proceeds to King County, the City of Seattle, and certain suburban cities. Ordinance 9430 provided for the use of Conservation Futures Levy proceeds collected in the years 1990 through 1993 for the completion of projects as set forth in Ordinance 9071. Ordinance 10750 established a biennial allocation process beginning in January 1, 1994. This amendment is entered into to provide for the allocation of proceeds made available from the 1994 and 1995 Conservation Futures Levy proceeds. The parties have agreed to amend the existing Interlocal Cooperation Agreement to provide for additions in the references to the fund allocation.

THIS AMENDMENT is entered into between the CITY OF SEATTLE ("City") and KING COUNTY, and amends and attaches to and is part thereof of the existing Interlocal Cooperation Agreement entered into between the parties on the 5<sup>th</sup> day of June, 1990.

The parties agree to the following amendments:

**Amendment 1: Article 1. Recitals**

A fifth paragraph is hereby added to the Recitals Section to provide for the 1994/95 Conservation Futures Levy allocation, and hereafter reads:

"On August 26, 1996, the King County Council passed Ordinance 12430, which appropriated a total of Eight Hundred Eighty-nine Thousand Dollars (\$889,000) in Conservation Futures Levy proceeds to the City of Seattle and the City of Renton. The Council has approved the allocation of 1994/95 Conservation Futures Levy proceeds to the jurisdictions and authorized the King County Executive to amend the existing interlocal cooperation agreements with the City of Seattle and the City of Renton in order to initiate the approved payments."

**Amendment 2: Article VII, Responsibility of County**

The first two sentences of this article are amended to include Attachment I, which lists the 1994/95 Conservation Futures Levy Allocation for the City of Seattle's Park Additions Project, and hereafter reads:


“Subject to the terms of this agreement, the County will provide Conservation Futures Levy Funds in the amounts shown in Attachments A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H and I. The City may request additional funds; however, the County has no obligation to provide funds to the City in excess of the amounts shown in Attachments A, B, C, D, E, F, G, H and I.”

In all other respects, the terms, conditions, duties and obligations of both parties shall remain the same as agreed to in the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement.

This document shall be attached to the existing Interlocal Cooperation Agreement.

### 1994/95 CONSERVATION FUTURES LEVY CITY OF SEATTLE AND CITY OF RENTON ALLOCATIONS

<u>Jurisdiction</u>	<u>Project</u>	<u>Allocation</u>
Seattle	Park Additions	\$439,000
Renton	Black River Forest	\$450,000

#### Conditions

**City of Seattle - Park Additions:** The goal of this project is to acquire properties adjacent to existing Seattle parks to consolidate ownership. Woodland properties are identified adjacent to Dearborn Park Elementary School, which has an ideal setting for its impressive outdoor education program. Property adjacent to Lawton Park that will provide needed access from the southern end of the park is identified, as is an addition to Colman Park, which has strong citizen support and is part of the City's Olmsted legacy.

**City of Renton - Black River Forest:** This 8.3 acre property is the final important inholding in the Black River Forest project, originally a joint King County/City of Renton 1989 Open Space Bond project. The property is located immediately adjacent to the major Great Blue Heron nesting area and has an approved permit for an office building/parking lot complex that would cover the site.

We understand that Amendments G and H, along with the First Amendment to the 1993 Regional Conservation Futures Interlocal, have been forwarded to your Department head for signing. Please let us know as soon as these are signed.

We are in the process of reviewing the Waterways 2000 Interlocal draft and will forward that to you next week for your review. The next task will be to draft the Annual CFT Interlocal Amendment to address the issues of reallocation authority. This will be done in early October after Judy Nevins returns from vacation.
