

**AMENDMENT TO THE CONSERVATION FUTURES
INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT
BETWEEN KING COUNTY AND THE CITY OF SNOQUALMIE
FOR OPEN SPACE ACQUISITION PROJECTS**

Preamble

The King County Council, through Ordinance 9128, has established a Conservation Futures Levy Fund and appropriated proceeds to King County and certain cities. This amendment is entered into to provide for the allocation of additional funds made available for open space acquisition.

THIS AMENDMENT is entered into between the CITY OF SNOQUALMIE and KING COUNTY, and amends and attaches to and is part thereof of the existing Interlocal Cooperation Agreement entered into between the parties on the 20th day of January, 1994, as previously amended.

The parties agree to the following amendments:

Amendment 1: Article 1. Recitals

A paragraph is hereby added to the Recitals Section to provide for a Conservation Futures Levy Fund allocation for the Snoqualmie Riverfront Reach Acquisition Project, and hereafter reads:

- On November 6, 2017 the King County Council passed Ordinance 18602, which appropriated a total of four hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$450,000) in Conservation Futures Levy proceeds to the City of Snoqualmie for the Snoqualmie Riverfront Reach Acquisition Project. On March 5, 2018 the King County Council passed Ordinance 18667 authorizing the King County Executive to enter into interlocal agreements with the City of Snoqualmie for the disbursement of Conservation Futures Funds appropriated in Ordinance 18602.

Amendment 2: Article V. Conditions of Agreement

Section 5.1 is amended to include Attachment I, which lists a 2018 Conservation Futures Levy Allocation for the Snoqualmie Riverfront Reach Acquisition Project.

Amendment 3: Article VII. Responsibilities of County

The first two sentences of this article are amended to include references to Attachment I, which lists a 2018 Conservation Futures Levy proceeds allocation for the Snoqualmie Riverfront Reach Acquisition Project:

Subject to the terms of this agreement, the County will provide Conservation Futures Levy Funds in the amounts shown in Attachments A through I, to be used for the Projects listed in Attachments A through I. The City may request additional funds; however, the County has no obligation to provide funds to the City for the Projects in excess of the total amounts shown in Attachments A through I. The County assumes no obligation for the future support of the Projects described herein except as expressly set forth in this agreement.

Amendment 4: Attachment I

The Attachments to the interlocal agreement are hereby amended by adding Attachment I, which is hereby attached to the interlocal agreement, incorporated therein and made a part thereof.

In all other respects, the terms, conditions, duties and obligations of both parties shall remain the same as agreed to in the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement as previously amended.

This document shall be attached to the existing Interlocal Cooperation Agreement.

Project Description:

1047226 – Snoqualmie – Snoqualmie Riverfront Reach Acquisition

This is a multiple-parcel project with a goal of acquiring a passive riverfront park along the Snoqualmie River in the City of Snoqualmie. The project area links the Snoqualmie Valley Regional Trail to the east with Snoqualmie’s historic downtown on Railroad Avenue SE to the west. The city seeks to acquire properties located in the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)-designated 100-year floodway and which have experienced repetitive flood damage. The city has made significant progress, acquiring 33 parcels along 1.2 miles of riverfront.

2018 fiscal year: The award funds acquisition of several of the targeted seven parcels (1.2 acres). CFT funds will be matched with King County Flood Control District funds and anticipated FEMA grant funds.
